This seminar will provide an overview of the process that starts with a Hoosier's bad decision and ends with their last day in khaki. Attendees will learn about the transition from county jail to IDOC intake, daily tasks and expectations of a case manager, evidence-based programming offered to address identified offender needs and the re-entry of the offender through community resources and county-based programming. Throughout this process these men and women come in contact with hundreds of Indiana residents employed within the correctional field all working towards the same goal of re-entry and reduced recidivism.	Alexis Dean is a native of Hoopeston, Illinois and a graduate of Indiana State University, earning her Bachelor's degree in Sociology. She has worked for the Indiana Department of Corrections for six years in a variety of positions including Substance Abuse Counselor, Therapeutic Community Substance Abuse Counselor, Indiana Veteran's Education and Transition Unit Re-Entry Specialist, Re-Entry and Addictions Services Monitor and her current title, Director of Case Management. Alexis has spent several years of her career in the field of addictions and is a Problem Gambling Counselor, Certified Alcohol and Drug Abuse Counselor (CADAC II) and a Licensed Addictions Counselor (LAC). A variety of approaches and models will be presented that can enhance clinician skills and clinical program capabilities to address co-occurring disorders. Dr. Riggs will elicit brief case presentations from participants to illustrate the application of integrated treatment principles.	Dr. Paula Riggs is Professor and Director of the Division of Substance Dependence in the Department of Psychiatry at the University of Colorado School of Medicine and board certified in child, adolescent and addiction psychiatry. Dr. Riggs is nationally known for her treatment development research in adolescents with co-occurring psychiatric and substance use disorders. She and her research group at the University of Colorado have led the field in conducting among the first large-scale controlled pharmacotherapy or combined pharmacotherapy/behavioral interventions trials in such youth. These include a recently completed multi-site trial conducted in the NIDA Clinical Trials Network (A Randomized Controlled Trial of OROS-MPH in Adolescents with ADHD and Substance Use Disorders; Riggs et al., JAACAP, 2011). Dr. Riggs and her team have also developed an evidence-based integrated mental health and substance treatment model known as <i>Encompass: Integrated Treatment for Adolescents and Young Adults</i> . Dr. Riggs has had a career-long commitment to teaching and mentoring junior investigators. She is currently the Principal Investigator of the NIDA-AACAP K12: Physician Career Development Award that provides addiction research training and mentorship to child and adolescent psychiatrists who wish to become career investigators in addiction and mental health research.

The "D" in PTSD stands for "Disorder" which raises the question: What is the disorder? One explanation is that it is a Disorder of Recovery from the symptoms (by-products) of trauma. These symptoms (by-products) impact and disrupt: 1) Families – shattered trust and loss of intimacy erodes the element of bonding essential to healthy relationships and leads to dysfunctional behaviors 2) Healthy Living – the emotional and existential pain untreated promotes self-medication of symptoms which often results in addiction 3) Self-esteem and Contentment - The individual's connection with SELF, their Higher Power or the Sacred, family, community, and nature are in disorder or in conflict.  These three areas of life that are impacted and disrupted need to be addressed in a holistic approach to the process of Recovery. Our presentation will describe the dynamics of disruption in each area and will propose approaches to treatment.	John E. Why is that? Dr. Kirby will present research exploring possible reasons for minimal parental involvement, discuss an ongoing study using parent/professional collaboration to engage treatment-resistant adolescents and youth, and suggest strategies that may increase meaningful parent involvement.	Dr. Kirby is a Senior Scientist and the Director of the Parents' Translational Research Center at the Treatment Research Institute (TRI) in Philadelphia. The TRI Parent Center brings together a team of researchers, parents, and communication specialists to develop, test, and distribute tools to help parents of adolescents and young adults with substance use problems. The changes limit take home medications as well as reporting annual information to the legislature on program metrics. This is an update on the response by DMHA and the vision of the OTP in the future.	Mick is an LCAC and an MBA from Taylor University. He was the Director of Addiction Recovery Services for the Indiana Department of Correction from 2008-2014 before accepting a position as the Manager of Opiate Treatment Programs for the Division of Mental Health and Addiction. During his tenure in the IDOC, Mick also a substance abuse counselor in the first C.L.I.F.F. Unit at Miami Correctional Facility that was what is believed to be the first methamphetamine specific therapeutic community in the prison setting. This program earned the 2008 National Award for the Offender Program of the Year

In response to statistics like this, communities around the country are implementing Crisis Intervention Teams for Youth (CIT for Youth), which bring youth-serving community leaders together to break down silos and ensure that the mental health needs of youth are met before they encounter the juvenile justice system. Once this partnership has been built and gaps/barriers have been identified and addressed, local leaders work together to plan for and conduct locally relevant CIT for Youth training to ensure that law enforcement, schools, mental health providers, and families are on the same page when it comes to responding to a youth in crisis.</p> <p>CIT for Youth training targets law enforcement officers, school resource officers, school personnel, and juvenile detention/ probation staff. Trainees learn how to effectively identify and respond to situations involving youth in mental health crisis. CIT for Youth training also familiarizes trainees with community resources available to support youth before and after a crisis has occurred.</p> <p>NAMI Indiana is currently working with six communities around the state to implement CIT for Youth: Porter County, St. Joseph County, Allen County, Henry County, Vanderburgh County, and Southeast Indiana's System of Care (One Community, One Family network).</p> <p>This session will cover the origins and goals of CIT for Youth, the status of Indiana's expansion efforts, and opportunities to bring CIT for Youth to new communities around Indiana.</p>	<p>Barbara Moser- Barbara joined NAMI Indiana in January 2014 to coordinate the expansion of CIT for Youth around Indiana. In this role, Barbara assists Indiana communities in developing local CIT for Youth coalitions and trainings.
